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## Overview of Resources to Help Ohio Communities Combat the Opioid Epidemic

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### **The Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act**

On July 22, 2016, President Obama signed into law Senator Portman's *Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act* (CARA), which fundamentally transforms the way the federal government treats addiction. CARA has been funded at \$267 million for Fiscal Year 2017.

#### *CARA Policy Reforms Implemented by Federal Agencies*

- Nurse practitioners and physicians assistants are now able to provide life-saving medication-assisted treatment.
- States, hospitals and social services will now report, track and assist drug dependent newborns and their families.
- The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) will follow opioid prescribing guidelines and put in place stronger oversight and accountability for the quality of care that they are providing our veterans. The VA will increase coordination and communication throughout the VA with medical facilities, providers, patients and their families and will hold the VA system accountable for appropriate care and quality standards. The VA will strengthen patient advocacy programs, expands access to integrative health and wellness, and enhance VA hiring practices to help prevent bad doctors from treating veterans.

#### *Sample of CARA Grant Awards:*

- \$400,000 to establish or enhance local drug courts.
- \$150,000 to expand addiction recovery support services.
- \$300,000 for drug overdose outreach projects to fund new approaches to connect an overdose survivor to treatment services.
- \$750,000 to pilot programs that use technology to expand treatment and recovery support services for individuals in rural areas.
- \$400,000 for diversion and alternative to incarceration projects in the criminal justice system.
- \$100,000 to fund statewide planning, coordination, and implementation projects between the criminal justice system and addiction and mental health services.
- \$400,000 to enhance prescription drug monitoring programs.
- More grant options included in this document.

#### *Outstanding Actions to Fully Implement CARA*

- Inter-Agency Task Force on Best Practices for Prescribers of Pain Medication - Report on pain management research and opioid prescribing and develop a strategy for disseminating information about best practices for pain management, opioid prescribing, and alternatives to opioids.
- National Public Awareness Campaign - National education and awareness campaign to address the dangers of opioid abuse and the association between prescription opioid abuse and heroin use and the dangerous effects of fentanyl.
- Expand Prescription Drug Take Back Programs - Coordinate with law enforcement, hospitals, and pharmacies to expand or make available disposal sites for unwanted prescription medications.
- Information Materials and Resources to Prevent Addiction Related to Youth Sports Injuries - Information focused on youth sports injuries and the risks associated with opioid use and misuse, treatment options for such injuries that do not involve the use of opioids, and how parents and youth can seek treatment for addiction.
- FDA Action Plan on Approving New Opioids - FDA must seek recommendations from an advisory committee prior to approving any new opioid and must specifically label any drug that is an opioid intended for use in pediatric populations. FDA must develop and dispense guidance on educating prescribers on opioid abuse and the use of abuse deterrent opioids.

- Opioid Research by the National Institute of Health - Intensify and coordinate clinical research with respect to understanding pain, developing alternative therapies for chronic pain, and developing alternatives to opioids for effective pain treatments.

### **The 21<sup>st</sup> Century Cures Act**

On December 13, 2016, President Obama signed legislation to provide \$1 billion to combat the opioid crisis. Ohio received \$26 million in Fiscal Year 2017 to help address the opioid crisis by increasing access to treatment, reducing unmet treatment needs, and reducing opioid-related overdose deaths. ### **Current and Past CURES Grants through OhioMHAS:**

**ECHO Model Training Grant (Due August 25<sup>th</sup>):** Through this grant, OhioMHAS seeks to partner with a university hospital system to develop and host Project ECHO (Extension for Community Healthcare Outcomes) models to empower clinicians to provide better care for persons with opioid use disorder.

**RFA Telehealth Hub Grant (Due August 24<sup>th</sup>):** This grant is intended to provide telehealth services for patients with opioid use disorder.

**Curricula Development Grant (Due August 24<sup>th</sup>):** OhioMHAS seeks applications to coordinate the development of standardized curricula that are used to educate professionals about causes and consequences of opioid use disorder.

**Emergency Department Grant (Due August 22<sup>nd</sup>):** With this grant, OhioMHAS will fund case management positions in eleven hospital emergency department settings to coordinate clinical care for persons with substance use disorders including opioid use disorders.

**ASAM Criteria Training (Due August 22<sup>nd</sup>):** OhioMHAS seeks applications to provide trainings that educate prescribers about the American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) Criteria.

**MOMS OTP Implementation Grant (Due August 22<sup>nd</sup>):** OhioMHAS seeks to award funding to support six opioid treatment program providers to implement and provide Maternal Opiate Medical Supports services (MOMS; <http://momsOhio.org/moms/>) to pregnant women with opioid use disorder.

**CURES Workforce Development (Due August 17<sup>th</sup>):** OhioMHAS seeks applications to provide workforce development management for 21st Century CURES activities.

**Request for Proposal Community Collective Impact Model for Change (Due August 25<sup>th</sup>):** The purpose of this Request for Proposal is to select organizations and/or individual(s) that will launch and sustain a "Backbone" organization to coordinate implementation of a long-term community level effort that impacts population level outcomes within the communities in identified Tier 1 and Tier 2 counties.

**Ohio DEA DATA 2000 Small Group Training (Due August 4<sup>th</sup>):** This OhioMHAS RFA seeks applications to provide DEA DATA 2000 Small Group Waiver Trainings for physicians in Ohio.

**Description:** This grant will be provided to a single entity who will serve as the central coordinating point for ensuring the requirements of this funding opportunity are met. Although there is a single grantee, applications including a consortia with other national allied professional associations are encouraged. The purpose of this program is to identify local physicians, other clinicians, and other providers, for example, advance practice nurses, physician assistants, peers and other healthcare professionals with expertise in treatment and in recovery services for opioid use disorders (OUDs).

**Description:** The purpose of this program is to allow first responders and members of other key community sectors to administer a drug or device approved or cleared under the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act for emergency treatment of known or suspected opioid overdose.

**Eligibility:** Eligible applicants include States, American Indian/Alaska Native tribes, tribal organizations, and consortia of tribes or tribal organizations, and local governmental entities including, but not limited to, municipal corporations, counties, cities, boroughs, incorporated towns, and townships.

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### 3. Improving Access to Overdose Treatment

**Application due date:** Monday, July 31, 2017

**Description:** SAMSHA will award OD Treatment Access funds to a Federally Qualified Health Center, Opioid Treatment Program, or practitioner who has a waiver to prescribe buprenorphine to expand access to Food and Drug Administration approved drugs or devices for emergency treatment of known or suspected opioid overdose. The grantee will partner with other prescribers at the community level to develop best practices for prescribing and co-prescribing FDA-approved overdose reversal drugs. After developing best practices, the grantee will train other prescribers in key community sectors as well as individuals who support persons at high risk for overdose.

**Eligibility:** SAMSHA is limiting eligibility to Federally Qualified Health Centers, opioid treatment programs, and practitioners dispensing narcotic drugs.

**Description:** The purpose of this program is to expand/enhance access to medication-assisted treatment (MAT) services for persons with an opioid use disorder seeking or receiving MAT.

**5. Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act: Building Communities of Recovery**

**Application Due Date:** Monday, July 3, 2017

**Description:** The purpose of this program is to mobilize resources within and outside of the recovery community to increase the prevalence and quality of long-term recovery support from substance abuse and addiction. These grants are intended to support the development, enhancement, expansion, and delivery of recovery support services (RSS) as well as promotion of and education about recovery. Programs will be principally governed by people in recovery from substance abuse and addiction who reflect the community served.

**Eligibility:** The statute limits eligibility for this program to RCOs that are domestic private nonprofit entities in states, territories, or tribes. RCOs are independent, nonprofit organizations led and governed by representatives of local communities of recovery. To ensure that recovery communities are fully represented, only organizations controlled and managed by members of the addiction recovery community are eligible to apply.

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## 10. Grants to Expand Substance Abuse Treatment Capacity in Family Treatment Drug Courts (Family Treatment Drug Courts)

**Description:** The purpose of this program is to expand and/or enhance substance use disorder (SUD) treatment services in existing family treatment drug courts, which use the family treatment drug court model in order to provide alcohol and drug treatment (including recovery support services, screening, assessment, case management, and program coordination) to parents with a SUD and/or co-occurring SUD and mental disorders who have had a dependency petition filed against them or are at risk of such filing. Services must address the needs of the family as a whole and include direct service provision to children (18 and under) of individuals served by this project.
